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The Long Wall – Upper Lewes and Wakefield Roads recent developments

Residents of Round Hill and some people living opposite this wall have been active in over-painting tagging and other marker pen/spray paint vandalism of this wall for many years, and have been keen to find a permanent solution. Recent discussions with Council Officers (Nicki Mansfield, Project Development Officer for Cityclean and Hannah Barker, Community Engagement Officer for BHCC) has resulted in a plan being submitted to the Environmental Improvement Budget Board (part of Housing*) to see if they might help pay for a group of artists to create a mural. Meanwhile we have been gathering views from local residents from our Facebook Noticeboard and by a letter drop to all the homes opposite the wall. The results marginally favour a natural world mural, but retaining the real ivy which has been growing down the wall all year. The picture shows how it might look:




On Monday 10th March 1952 a length of the (old) long wall collapsed into the Upper Lewes Road. In the background you can see the gable of Sylvan Hall and some of the newly built flats.




Another Lamppost Lost at the bottom of Belton Road

Whilst installing the new LED street light engineers discovered that the cast iron spigot to which the swan neck is fitted was so corroded that it was unsafe to use. So that cast iron post has gone and a steel tube has replaced it.



It was the only post of this particular design on Round Hill – quite a rarity, now lost. The arrow marks the point where the base of the swan neck slips over the spigot and three bolts tighten up to hold it in place (just 2 bolts visible here).





Round Hill - Reduce Reuse Recycle

Welcome to the third edition of Round Hill – Reduce, Reuse, Recycle. This pull-out supplement will help you recycle right. Please, please read it - even if you think you're already an eco expert - and keep it for future reference. If you're not recycling right, you're not recycling!

Be honest - are you a wishcycler?



You have great intentions and you care about the impact of plastic and other waste on the planet....



You rely on packaging information for your recycling decisions (just because it is generally recycled doesn't mean it is in Brighton)



You put things in the recycling - just in case (you assume it's better than putting it in landfill)



You think you understand the recycling rules - but you haven't read them lately (or maybe ever)



You don't clean your recycling



If you 'recycle' dirty or inappropriate items you contaminate the load. Too much contamination (more than 10%) and there's a risk the whole load will be incinerated. If this happens, recycling was a total waste of time and effort. It also means that the council won't receive recycling credits which results in less money to support recycling services. A lose, lose situation.

Please don't be a wishcycler!

The good news is - with your great intentions - and a little knowledge you can recycle right

Let's all Recycle Right!

Please check what BHCC does (and doesn't!) recycle at the kerbside in the list below:

Plastic	Right PLASTIC BOTTLES ONLY! Ask yourself, is it plastic, is it a bottle? If your answer is yes and yes - wash it and squash it! Milk bottles put the lid inside - all other bottles screw the lid on	Wrong IF IT'S NOT A BOTTLE DO NOT PUT IT IN YOUR RECYCLING! Even if it has a recycling symbol No tubs, no trays, NOTHING!
Paper 🖂	Any paper. Envelopes including windows, flyers, newspapers, directories.	No paper and greeting cards with foil or glitter
Cardboa	rd Boxes - remove self-adhesive tape Check for recycling symbol on packaging Collapse boxes and cut to roughly magazine size (A4)	NO CARTONS (tetra pack) OR COFFEE CUPS – they look like cardboard but contain plastic Some other cardboard looking packaging has plastic IF YOU ARE NOT SURE - CHECK FOR A (CARD/PAPER) RECYCLING SYMBOL No greasy items - such as pizza boxes
Metal O	Food and drinks cans - rinsed Empty aerosols Lids - from glass jars only	No tubes of puree or toothpaste No metal bottle lids (beer or any other)
Glass	Bottles and jars Wash and put out in a SEPARATE BOX	No random bits of glass No broken glass
Batteries	7	No longer collected - take to a collection bin in shops that sell them

Don't forget - many large supermarkets (closest Sainsbury's Lewes Road) now collect clean, soft plastic including - wrappers, crisp, confectionary and snack packets, pouches and sachets, carrier bags and plastic film. Check online and instore for the full list
